Short information sessions will be held at the March, April and May meetings. These will serve to refresh our memories about the different aspects of a flower show and will explain any NGC rule changes that may have occurred in the past two years.

When purchasing plants, bulbs, seeds that you may want to use to enter in the show, SAVE the complete name of the item as listed on the package. You will need this information when filling out your entry tag.

Also, please save any green glass bottles (beer, pop, wine, etc) to use for horticultural specimens at the show.

Division III: Special Exhibits "Capturing Beauty"

Section A: Educational Exhibits: "Sharing Knowledge"

Exhibit 1. Planting Special Places

(ideas – hillside, shady area, deck, window boxes, entry planters)

Exhibit 2. Experiencing Garden Club

(Why join LOGC? – tours, speakers, projects, friendships, etc.)

Exhibit 3. Green and Growing

(uses of waste, organic gardens, plant sales, composting

The exhibit has to be 18 sq. feet; there are "story boards" you may use, written information needs to be brief/to the point, use pictures, display must have some plant material, use area in front of board, make handouts available if necessary. The Exhibit title needs to be depicted – the ideas are listed to give just that - *ideas*. Select one or two ideas not everything. Your exhibit is a teaching tool. Printing/signs readable from at least 3ft in front of table, better if larger.

Section B: Artistic Crafts "Creating Design"

- Class 1. <u>Sending Thoughts</u> Greeting Card, max. size 5&1/2 x 7 inches approx. A handmade card, no verse inside, no envelope, <u>some plant material fresh and/or dried</u>
- Class 2. Welcome Home Wreath, max size outside width 12 inches, fresh and /or dried plant material.
- Class 3. <u>Joyous Memories</u> Photograph, 4x6 inches max. unframed, 35m or digital
 - 3a. Single bloom
 - 3b. Garden View

These items can be made **ahead** of time – now in fact. Many of you probably do make greeting cards. If not, try it. Chose a holiday, a sentiment, you don't need writing if your design depicts the occasion.

The wreath can be made on a base or the base can be a part of the design. A ribbon or some article (such as pinecones, pods, etc) may be used as long as it is not plastic or other artificial material). Again, fresh and/or dried material may be use.

Photographs: At the last show we heard many of you say – "Oh, I could have entered a picture of …." Yes, you could and we want you to so we have made it very easy – no frames, not even mats, the size is one you can get easily at COSCO or wherever you take you film or digital work. Bring on those pictures of your yard, deck plantings, the special clematis, blooming crabapple tree, whatever.

Scilla siberica 'Spring Beauty'

Sanguinaria canadensis 'Bloodroot'

This *Siberian Squill* likes well drained loamy soil and filtered sunlight. Woodland gardens that are not boggy will make this plant happy. It is very hardy and needs some time below freezing in order to produce flowers. If made happy it will quickly increase from seeds and vegetative offsets. Plant in Sun to part shade. About 6 inches high, it will bloom in early spring (or, late winter).

The *Sanguinaria canadensis* 'Bloodroot' is from the Papaveraceae or more commonly the Poppy Family. it has medicinal uses and the root juice has been used as a dye. This is the only species of the genus Sanguinaria and while it can sometimes be found abundantly it is generally somewhat rare. A blood red juice from the rhizome gives it the name Bloodroot. I had the task of finding this plant for Anne when she was unable to attend a plant swap we planned on attending together. I could not find the plant and so I asked a woman who looked to me like she would be knowledgeable. "Not any here" was her response! But, I have some at home I will share! So, I and four other gardeners got to visit her gardens and each came away with a different but desired plant. Gardeners, are truly wonderful people.

This month featured early bloomers. I know you have imagined the changes to be made to your garden in the past few months which makes us all early bloomers in our minds at least. It won't be long before those plants we ordered from the online or mail order catalogs will be here. Let's see, what did I order and from who?

Taste That!

Toscana Soup

serves four as appetizer, or 2 as an entree

A blend of potatoes, kale, and Italian sausage in a slightly spicy chicken and cream broth.

2 3/4 cups chicken stock or broth 1/2 pound spicy Italian sausage

1/4 cup heavy cream 1/4 teaspoon salt

1 medium russet potato 1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper flake

- 1. Combine the broth and cream in a saucepan over medium heat.
- 2. Slice the unpeeled potato into 1/4 inch slices, then quarter the slices and add them to the soup.
- 3. Add the kale.
- 4. Grill or saut'e the sausage. Let cool, then cut the sausage at an angle into slices 1/2 inch thick.
 - 5. Add the sausage and the spices to the soup and let simmer for about 2 hours.
