**Section A:** Educational Exhibits: "Sharing Knowledge" Exhibit 1. <u>Planting Special Places</u> (ideas – hillside, shady area, deck, window boxes, entry planters) Exhibit 2. <u>Experiencing Garden Club</u> (Why join LOGC? – tours, speakers, projects, friendships, etc.) Exhibit 3. <u>Green and Growing</u> (uses of waste, organic gardens, plant sales, composting The exhibit has to be 18 sq. feet; there are "story boards" you may use, written information needs to be brief/to the point, use pictures, display must have some plant material, use area in front of board, make handouts available if necessary. The <u>Exhibit title needs to be depicted</u> – the ideas are listed to give just that - *ideas*. Select one or two ideas not everything. Your exhibit is a teaching tool. Printing/signs readable from at least 3ft in front of table, better if larger.

**Section B:** Artistic Crafts "Creating Design" Class 1. <u>Sending Thoughts</u> - Greeting Card, max. size 5&1/2 x 7 inches approx. A handmade card, no verse inside, no envelope, <u>some plant material fresh and/or driedClass 2.</u>

<u>Welcome Home</u> – Wreath, max size outside width 12 inches, fresh and /or dried plant material.Class 3. <u>Joyous Memories</u> – Photograph, 4x6 inches max. unframed, 35m or digital

- 3a. Single bloom
- 3b. Garden View

These items can be made **ahead** of time – now in fact. Many of you probably do make greeting cards. If not, try it. Chose a holiday, a sentiment, you don't need writing if your design depicts the occasion.

The wreath can be made on a base or the base can be a part of the design. A ribbon or some article (such as pinecones, pods, etc) may be used as long as it is not plastic or other artificial material). Again, fresh and/or dried material may be use.

Bee's --- on Goldenrod

#### Hosta, "Popo"

A beautiful blue green miniature Hosta that has leaves with a strongly upward cupping habit. It forms a very tidy and attractive compact mount of foliage. This Hosta will work equally well in a formal setting or in a casual garden.

This Hosta grows to 8 inches high and forms a mound that is 10 inches in diameter. The leaves are 3.5 inches long by 2.5 inches wide. The oval leaves are shiny and somewhat wavy.

This perennial has lavender flowers. The tubular flowers bloom in late June and are held on 10 inch tall bloom stalks. Hosta Popo is a beautiful shade plant that can fit into the smallest of gardens. The light blue/green leaves would make a great contrast plants with brighter colored foliage.

Goldenrods, are strong-stemmed plants, often growing to 6 feet tall, with either smooth or lightly toothed alternate leaves arising from a root crown or rhizome. They bloom in late summer or fall with sprays of small, usually golden-yellow flowers. Goldenrods are happy in full sun or partial shade with good, well-drained garden soil. They will also do well in moist conditions. Great for the wild garden, stream side, or naturalized in meadow gardens, goldenrods are striking in the open bed or border. They are excellent for cutting.

Scientific name of goldenrod: Solidago hybrids

## Fruit Pizza: Compliments of Sheila Munich, we tasted while viewing her beautiful gardens.

#### **Crust:**

350 degrees

1/2 cup powdered sugar

1 cup butter (or marg)

2 cups flour

Combine ingredients and press into 10x14 pan. Bake for approx 10 min

#### **Citrus Topping:**

1 cup pineapple juice (or juice of your choice)

2 TBLS cornstarch

½ cup sugar

1 TBLS lemon juice

While crust is baking, combine the citrus ingredients over heat until it thickens. Set aside and cool.

#### **Topping:**

1/3 cup sugar

1tsp. vanilla

1 8oz cream cheese

Beat together and spread on the cooled crust. At this point, I score my cut lines so I can place the fruit in the center of each square)

#### Fruit:

Berries (strawberries, blue berries, raspberries) and kiwi Place fruit on cream cheese topping. Using a small tsp, spoon a little of the citrus topping over the fruit. Cut and chill until ready to serve.
